KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Seema Yasmin, MD

*Director, Stanford Health Communication Initiative;
Clinical Assistant Professor, School of Medicine, Stanford University*

Seema Yasmin, MD, is a public health physician, stand-up comedian, author, professor, and Emmy award-winning science journalist. Dr. Yasmin trained in medicine at the University of Cambridge and in journalism at the University of Toronto.

After working as a hospitalist in East London, she moved to the United States to serve as a disease detective in the federal government's Epidemic Intelligence Service (EIS). As an EIS Officer, she investigated disease outbreaks in maximum security prisons, Indian reservations, and hospitals, and came face-to-face with the devastation of anti-vaccine disinformation.

Dr. Yasmin was a CNN medical analyst from 2014-2021, covering Ebola, Zika, and Covid. She is director of the Stanford Health Communication Initiative and clinical assistant professor at the School of Medicine at Stanford University. She is the author of 11 books of fiction, poetry, and non-fiction; and four forthcoming books, including the middle grade biographical series, *Muslim Mavericks*; and *Unbecoming*, a young adult novel about abortion which is being adapted into a feature film.

Dr. Yasmin splits her time between Las Vegas, Los Angeles, and London and can be found in comedy clubs everywhere performing her comedy special, *Where is My Wife?*

Risa Lavizzo-Mourey, MD, MBA

Risa Lavizzo-Mourey, MD, MBA, is President Emerita of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) and the RWJF PIK Professor Emerita of Health Policy and Health Equity at the University of Pennsylvania.

At RWJF, she led groundbreaking health initiatives to create healthier communities, integrate health systems, and ensure every U.S. child has the opportunity to grow up at a healthy weight. These efforts culminated in the Foundation's vision of building a Culture of Health, enabling Americans to live longer, healthier lives.

A geriatric specialist, Dr. Lavizzo-Mourey joined RWJF from the University of Pennsylvania, where she served as the Sylvan Eisman Professor of Medicine and Health Care Systems. She also directed Penn's Institute on Aging and held the position of chief of geriatric medicine at the University of Pennsylvania's School of Medicine. Beyond her work at the Foundation, she has contributed to the White House Health Care Reform Task Force and served on numerous federal advisory committees.

Dr. Lavizzo-Mourey earned her medical degree from Harvard Medical School and a Master of Business Administration from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania. Her accolades include the National Academy of Medicine's Gustav O. Lienhard Award for Advancement of Health Care, the American Public Health Association's Sedgwick Memorial Medal for Distinguished Service in Public Health, and the American College of Physicians' Steven Weinberger Award for Physician Leaders. As a master of the American College of Medicine, she is also a member of the National Academy of Medicine, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Philosophical Society, and a former member of the President's Council for Fitness, Sports, and Nutrition. Dr. Lavizzo-Mourey and her husband, Robert Lavizzo-Mourey, PhD, are proud parents of two adult children and two grandchildren.

Jenelle Krishnamoorthy, PhD

Senior Vice President and Head of Global Policy & Public Affairs, Merck & Co.

Jenelle Krishnamoorthy, PhD, is the Senior Vice President and Head of Global Policy & Public Affairs at Merck & Co., also known as MSD outside the United States and Canada, with deep expertise in domestic and global health policy. Dr. Krishnamoorthy recently completed her tenure on the SWHR Board of Directors, having served on the Board since 2018 and as a member of the Executive Committee through 2025.

In her role at Merck, she leads integrated U.S. and global policy and public affairs strategy, steering enterprise-wide efforts to advance evidence-based policy, foster strategic partnerships, and expand sustainable access to Merck's medicines and vaccines worldwide. Since joining Merck in 2015, Dr. Krishnamoorthy has delivered significant impact – most recently as vice president and head of global public policy – shaping and executing strategic policy and advocacy plans across our portfolio. Her deep expertise in U.S. and global health policy, coupled with prior senior government roles has been pivotal in navigating complex health care landscapes.

Before joining Merck, Dr. Krishnamoorthy served as a Science and Technology Policy Fellow with the American Association for the Advancement of Science in Washington, D.C.; a Health Policy Staff Director for the U.S. Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP), with oversight of the Food and Drug Administration, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the National Institutes of Health (NIH); and within the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of South and Central Asian Affairs, advancing U.S. policy in health, science, technology, and the environment.

Dr. Krishnamoorthy completed her pediatric clinical psychology residency and postdoctoral fellowship at Brown Medical School, where she conducted research supported by NIH in the areas of childhood obesity and tobacco issues. Dr. Krishnamoorthy received her Bachelor of Science from Randolph-Macon College, Master of Science from the University of Tennessee, and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) from Virginia Commonwealth University. Dr. Krishnamoorthy is licensed to practice in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Basmah Safdar, MD, MSc

Director, Women's Health Research at Yale;

Norma Weinberg Spungen and Joan Lebson Bildner Professor in Women's Health Research, Yale School of Medicine

Basmah Safdar, MD, MSc, is an emergency medicine physician and internationally recognized scholar in sex-specific research with a focus on microvascular health. She is the Norma Weinberg Spungen and Joan Lebson Bildner Professor in Women's Health Research and Director of Women's Health Research at Yale (WHRY) — an interdisciplinary research center dedicated to improving the lives of women through scientific discovery, education, translation, and dissemination. Since 1998, the center has incubated studies to advance women's health across a multitude of diseases and conditions, driving innovation and impact.

Dr. Safdar applies a systems lens and servant leadership ethos with her clinical and academic expertise to inspire innovation and cultivate creative thinking that drives growth

and improves outcomes. In 2011, Dr. Safdar's seminal work exposed critical gaps in sex-specific emergency medicine research, catalyzing a National Institutes of Health (NIH)-funded national consensus conference and co-creating a national advocacy group. Funded by the NIH, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, foundations, and industry awards, the Safdar Lab is committed to precision-based diagnostics and clinical trials through an integrated, multidisciplinary clinical approach. She is past president of the Academy of Women in Academic Emergency Medicine (AWAEM), a 2024 Executive Leadership in Academic Medicine (ELAM) Fellow, and recipient of AWAEM's Mid-Career Faculty and Leadership Awards. She earned her Doctor of Medicine (MD) from Aga Khan University and a Master of Science in Epidemiology from Harvard.

WOMEN'S HEALTH VISIONARY AWARD HONOREE



Kedra Wallace, PhD

Professor of Pharmacology and Toxicology,

Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology, University of Mississippi Medical Center

Kedra Wallace, PhD, is a tenured Professor of Pharmacology and Toxicology (primary appointment) and Obstetrics and Gynecology (secondary appointment) at the University of Mississippi Medical Center (UMMC) in Jackson, Mississippi. She currently serves within the School of Medicine and has held significant academic leadership roles, including Associate Dean for Academic and Faculty Affairs in the School of Population Health and Program Director of the Master of Science in Clinical Investigation Graduate Program. Dr. Wallace was also a member of SWHR's original uterine fibroids and endometriosis working groups, which have informed the development of core SWHR resources in each of these spaces.

Dr. Wallace attended Millsaps College before completing her Master of Science in pharmacology and toxicology and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) in neuroscience at UMMC. She subsequently completed postdoctoral training in obstetrics and gynecology at UMMC. Her research focuses on the pathophysiology of hypertensive disorders of pregnancy, including preeclampsia and HELLP (Hemolysis, Elevated

Liver enzymes, and Low Platelets) Syndrome, as well as uterine fibroids and maternal cardiovascular health. She has made substantial contributions to understanding immune mechanisms, inflammation, endothelial dysfunction, and long-term maternal and offspring outcomes associated with hypertensive pregnancies.

Dr. Wallace has authored or co-authored more than 100 peer-reviewed publications in leading journals, including *Hypertension*, *American Journal of Obstetrics & Gynecology*, *JAMA*, and *The New England Journal of Medicine*. She has received numerous honors recognizing her research excellence and mentorship, including a Mid-Career Faculty Award from the Group on Women in Medicine and Science and multiple research excellence awards from UMMC. Nationally, Dr. Wallace contributes to the scientific community through service roles with organizations such as the American Physiological Society, the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Jennifer Klein

*Professor of Professional Practice; Director, Women's Initiative, Institute of Global Politics,
Columbia University School of International and Public Affairs*

Jennifer Klein is a professor of professional practice and director of the Institute of Global Politics Women's Initiative at the School of International and Public Affairs at Columbia University.

During the Biden administration, Klein was an Assistant to the President and the Director of the White House Gender Policy Council. Klein advised the president and vice president on domestic and foreign policy issues, including health and reproductive rights, gender-based violence, women's economic security, and human rights and democratic participation. During the Obama administration, Klein served as a Deputy and Senior Advisor in the Office of Global Women's Issues at the Department of State. During the Clinton administration, she worked at the White House in a dual appointment as First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton's

Senior Domestic Policy Advisor and a Special Assistant to the President on the Domestic Policy Council.

A graduate of Columbia Law School and Brown University, Klein began her career at Simpson Thacher & Bartlett. She has taught as an adjunct professor at the Georgetown University Law Center, as a senior visiting fellow in international and public affairs at the Watson Institute at Brown University, and as a visiting fellow at the Center for Global Legal Challenges at Yale Law School. She currently serves on the Board of the National Women's Law Center and has also served on the Brown University Women's Leadership Council, the Board of International Center for Research on Women, and the Global Institute for Women's Leadership Advisory Council at King's College London.

Alex Taylor

Co-founder, Perelel Health

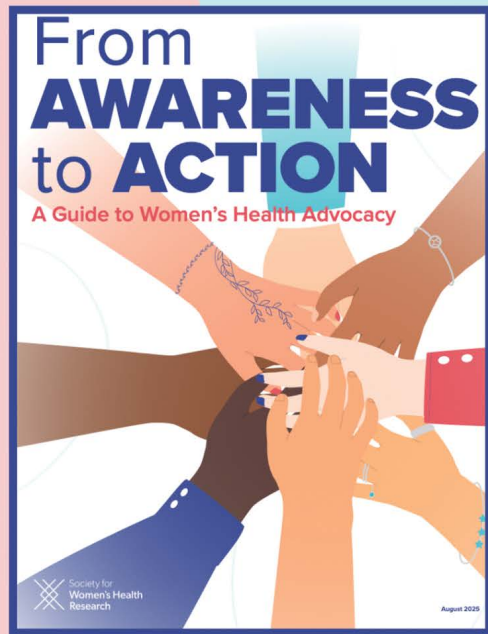
Alex Taylor is a women's health advocate, founder, and cultural voice focused on elevating women's health to a national priority. She is the co-founder of Perelel, a Unilever-backed women's health company offering OB/GYN-founded, clinically backed nutrition for every stage of a woman's hormonal life. Through Perelel, Taylor launched the Perelel Pledge for Women's Health Equity, a \$10 million commitment to fund women's health research and expand access to maternal care in the United States. In just five years, more than \$5.5 million of that pledge has already been deployed. Taylor mobilized national attention through Perelel Universe, an advocacy campaign featuring Mandy Moore that launched a petition to Congress calling for increased National Institutes of Health funding for women's health research. The campaign garnered more than 30,000 signatures in a matter of weeks in 2024.

She also works with policymakers and institutions to advance women's health research, including collaborating with the Biden administration's White House Gender Policy Council, serving on the Board of the Foundation for Women's Health, and participating in the Milken Institute's Women's Health Innovation Network. In September 2025, together with SWHR and Hollywood policy and political advisor Hannah Linkenhoker, she hosted a Congressional Roundtable at the U.S. Capitol with Lupita Nyong'o and Mandy Moore to advance momentum around women's health research and maternal care.

Most recently, Alex joined forces with Gloria Steinem to bring the women's health research gap to the national stage by hosting a Talking Circle on women's health, which was featured in *The New York Times*.

Alex lives in Los Angeles with her husband and two children.

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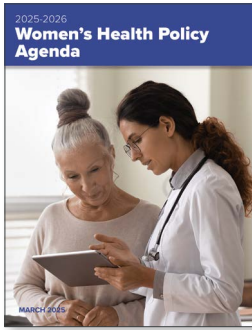
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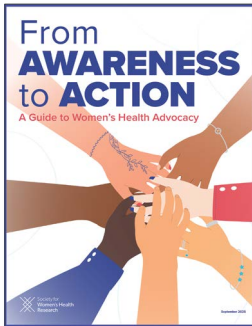
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2025-2026 Policy Agenda

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SWHR 2026 PROGRAMS

Autoimmune Rare Disease



Of the 24 million Americans affected by autoimmune diseases, four out of five are women. Building on SWHR's autoimmune portfolio, this program aims to educate patients and providers about rare autoimmune diseases and conditions that impact women across the lifespan.

Bone Health



U.S. women have a 50% lifetime risk of fracture starting at age 50, but 84% of Americans are not tested or treated for osteoporosis. This program continues SWHR's ongoing bone health work, with a special emphasis improving policy and empowering women to prioritize their bone health as they age and become eligible for Medicare.

Clinical Trials



Women have historically faced several barriers that have hindered their participation and representation in clinical trials, from historical exclusion in research to bias in recruitment and logistical barriers. This program aims to raise awareness and begin addressing these barriers, leading to more effective and safe health care solutions tailored to women's health needs.

Coalition to Advance Maternal Therapeutics

SWHR oversees the administration of the Coalition to Advance Maternal Therapeutics (CAMT), which was launched in 2014 with the goals of better understanding the safety and efficacy of prescription drugs, therapeutics, and vaccines used during pregnancy and breastfeeding and raising awareness among policymakers and industry about the need to include pregnant and lactating women in clinical trials. The CAMT Steering Committee includes the American College of Obstetricians & Gynecologists, Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation, March of Dimes, Preeclampsia Foundation, Society for Maternal-Fetal Medicine, and SWHR. Its membership comprises nonprofits, medical societies, researchers, and a Corporate Advisory Committee of maternal health industry leaders. Learn more at safemeds4moms.org.

Gynecologic Health

 Sumitomo Pharma

Gynecologic health conditions impact millions of women. In this program, SWHR builds on its existing framework across endometriosis, uterine fibroids, and polycystic ovary syndrome (PCOS) to disseminate information and improve the knowledge base for women living with these conditions.

Heart Health

Heart disease is the number one killer of women and men in the United States, but only 44% of women recognize heart disease as a risk factor for death. This program explores strategies to eliminate barriers to accessing care and coverage for women living with or at risk for heart disease and provides educational resources in both English and Spanish to help young adult women understand their risks. This program includes grant support from the Heart Disease Research Foundation.

SWHR 2026 PROGRAMS

Medicare

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The Medicare enrollment process is an essential part of turning 65, but it can be complicated. This program provides pertinent information for women as they prepare for and transition into Medicare beneficiaries and/or for those who serve as caregivers for someone on Medicare. The program focuses on heart health, bone health, brain health, and obesity.

Menopause

Many women will spend one-third to half of their lives post-menopause, and experience symptoms that range from hot flashes and sleep disturbances to bone density loss and changes in mood. This program raises awareness of the impacts of the menopausal transition while promoting menopause education, wellness, and supportive workplace environments. In addition to advancing education and employer engagement, the program also highlights opportunities for policy advocacy, encouraging evidence-based policies and workplace practices that support women's health during midlife.

Migraine



Three out of four migraine patients are women, and they are most commonly between the ages of 20 and 45. Despite this high burden, significant gaps remain in understanding migraines across the life course. There is a need for more research on migraine in women, including how hormonal fluctuations affect migraine onset, severity, and frequency. This program builds on SWHR's previous work in the migraine and pain space.

SWHR 2026 PROGRAMS



Obesity is a serious and rising health epidemic that affects nearly 93 million Americans, and prevalence is predicted to climb to 120 million within the next five years. This program aims to shed light and initiate action on this critical health concern to improve the cardiometabolic health of women living with obesity, with a focus on the scientific gaps in the field.



Narcolepsy is a chronic neurological disorder of the sleep-wake cycle. Narcolepsy affects women differently throughout their lifespan, including in preparation for pregnancy and motherhood. This program aims to improve education and build consensus between women, families, and clinicians on narcolepsy and family building.



There are more than 10,000 rare diseases affecting millions of people in the United States, and women are disproportionately affected by rare and chronic diseases. Women with rare diseases experience delays in diagnosis and treatment and face unique challenges in caring for themselves and their families. This program addresses knowledge and policy gaps to improve the health outcomes for women living with rare disease.



Diagnostic tools can help guide treatments, inform patient decision-making, and promote positive health outcomes. This program highlights the value of innovative diagnostics to improve health outcomes for women across the lifespan and across conditions, with special emphasis on maternal health and preeclampsia.

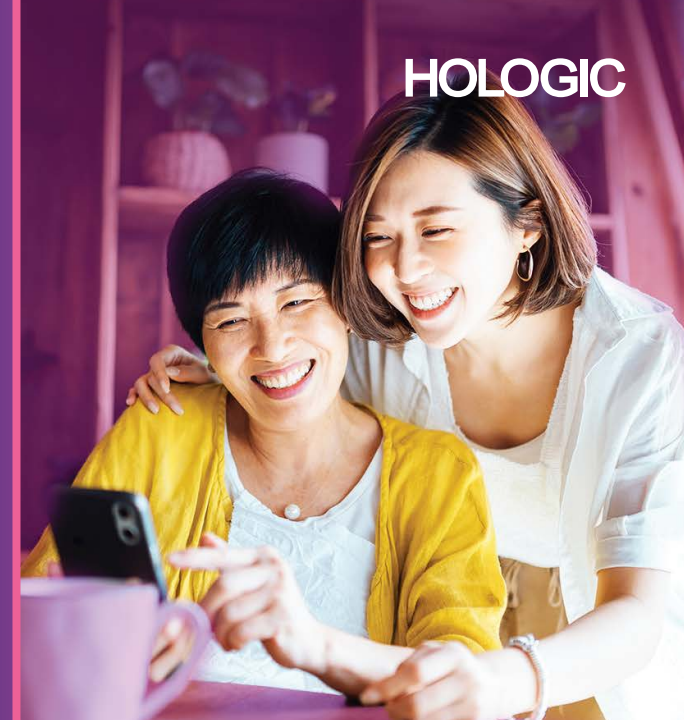
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
